Judged by Your Own Example

Matthew 7:1-6

His whole message here, **Matt. 5:3-7:27**, He is **building** something for us

- Each additional piece **adds support** to what follows
- It's all From God (righteousness, 5:6)
- It's all relational in nature (with Him & others, 5:9)
- It's all FOR us (Individually & together, 5:13-14)

What does Jesus want FOR us?

- He wants us to live free & confident
- Not in fear of judgement
- I John 4:17, "Love has been perfected among us in this: that we may have boldness in the day of judgment; because as He is, so are we in this world."

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The meat of what He's saying is in **Vs. 1-2**

- Vs. 3-4 must be heard in light of them
- Vs. 5 casts 3 & 4 in the full light of personal application
- **Vs. 6** reminds them/us of things known since Solomon
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So, what did Jesus mean?

- What should they/we understand?

Here's one of those places where English is lacking

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- Vs. 1
 - "Judge" = to decide to condemn
 - "Judged" = to punish, damn or sentence to

Vs. 2

- "Judgement" = the decision to avenge
- *"Measure"* = to determine **proportion** by **fixed standard**
- "Measured" = to return by opposite contrast (mirrored)

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So...

"Judge (decide to condemn) not, that you be not judged (punished, damned or sentenced to). For with what judgment (decision to avenge) you judge (decide to condemn), you will be judged (punished, damned or sentenced to); and with the measure (proportion by fixed standard) you use, it will be measured (returned by opposite contrast/mirrored) back to you."

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How does that sound?

Basically, "Your judgement will be **a reflection**" - It's a dangerous thing to step into God's role

Jesus is trying to protect us

John 3:17, "For God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world through Him might be saved."

How do you want to be judged by God?

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- How do you think He views some political commentary in recent years?
- Especially by those identified with Christ

Romans 14:4-13

Where to start?

- Paul suggests **with ourselves** would be a good place

I Corinthians 11:31,

"If we were properly evaluating ourselves, we would not be judged"

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Vs. **3-5** is about **not requiring of ourselves first**, the standard we place on others.

The example we set is the highest standard we can ask of others

Maybe deciding, "I'm going to evaluate & treat you the way **I want God to evaluate** & **treat me**" would be helpful.

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Does V. 6 seem a bit odd?

Proverbs 18:2 & 23:9 address the same issue

"Fools have no interest in understanding; they only want to air their own opinions."

"Don't waste your breath on fools, for they will despise the wisest advice."

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What Jesus says next could use some insight as well
